



A Stunning Spring in the Desert



One word can describe California's weather so far in 2005—wet. While far northern California's Klamath Basin is still in a drought, the epic rains this winter have been a boon to the rest of the state, particularly the desert. With rainfall breaking 100 year old records, the desert is blooming with more wildflowers than anyone has ever seen. The rain has caused southern California's ephemeral streams, wetlands, and lakes to look like they aren't going away any time soon. Parts of Death Valley have even been likened to Hawaii's Napali Coast. All of this beauty is drawing a huge influx of new visitors. People are spending time in those wild lands in similarly record numbers, enjoying a very special desert experience. At CWC, we're always happy to hear of folks heading to the outdoors. It's often time spent in nature, especially at a young age, that makes people value and want to protect our last wild places.

Overwhelming public support has further protected one of the crown jewels of the desert. In February, the California State Parks Commission voted to permanently protect almost 56,000 acres of desert beauty as wilderness in Anza-Borrego Desert State Park. CWC's Golden State Wilderness Campaign submitted recommendations, educated commissioners, and rallied support for this popular park and home to the endangered peninsular bighorn sheep. These lands are now protected under the California Wilderness Act that protects unique state lands for perpetuity—as the federal Wilderness Act does for national lands. This was a great victory for our Golden State Wilderness Campaign because it increased the size of the State Wilderness Preservation System by over ten percent. When there is so much bad news on the environment coming out of Washington, DC, it's great to have some positive news here at home. And the best way to celebrate is to travel to the desert to see those once in a lifetime wildflowers!

New Era of Conservation in Anza-Borrego

In February, the State Parks and Recreation Commission received a huge round of applause when it unanimously approved the Anza-Borrego Desert State Park General Plan. The plan designates nearly 56,000 acres in the park as wilderness and 440 acres as a cultural preserve in order to protect the sensitive natural and cultural resources of this unique area.

Anza-Borrego Desert State Park is truly an international jewel. Located in Riverside and San Diego counties, it is among the largest state parks in the United States. Anza-Borrego is a critical refuge for endangered plant and wildlife species, including approximately 60% of California's endangered peninsular bighorn sheep. It is also home to a multitude of historical and cultural resources, which provide glimpses into the human history of the region. Anza-Borrego's magnificent arid landscape of giant boulders, mesas, canyons, sand dunes, and majestic native palm trees attracts visitors from around the world.

Though founded in 1933, Anza-Borrego has never had a management plan to guide the California Department of Parks and Recreation's stewardship of the area. Over the last few years, park staff worked hard to develop a General Management Plan (GMP) for Anza-Borrego.

The management plan is visionary in many ways. It appropriately focuses on management of park resources within natural boundaries, such as watersheds and air basins, rather than solely within property lines. The plan encourages park staff to be a voice in planning processes outside the boundaries of the park when a proposal may impact resources within the boundaries. It also encourages the acquisition of lands outside the park from willing sellers to foster habitat connectivity and landscape linkages and minimize negative effects and conflicts from adjacent land uses.

When it was first released in 2003, off-road vehicle lobbying groups were successful in convincing the new Schwarzenegger administration to delay a vote on the GMP by the State Parks and Recreation Commission. Park staff re-released the draft for public comment last summer and the Commission finally met to consider its adoption in February. Conservationists voiced their support at each stage. With their approval of the plan, Commissioners sent a clear message that state parks are places that deserve strong measures of protection and set a good precedent for plans not yet approved, like Red Rock Canyon State Park.

Highlights of California's Threatened Wild Places

The California Wilderness Coalition has released its fourth annual *California's 10 Most Threatened Wild Places* report, drawing attention to wilderness lands at risk across the state.

The report is a result of extensive surveys with conservation groups, scientists, and other wilderness experts. It demonstrates both the severity of the threats facing our natural heritage and the diversity of places affected. Among the most serious threats to wild California are the Bush Administration's rollback of federal forest protections and the growing political clout of extreme off-road vehicle lobbying groups.

North Coast Wilderness Bill Gains Momentum

Fresh on the heels of a unanimous Senate victory at the close of 2004, CWC continues to build government support for the Northern California Coastal Wild Heritage Wilderness Act (H.R. 233/S. 128) in 2005. Congressman Mike Thompson quickly reintroduced the bill in the new Congress on January 4TH, and Senators Barbara Boxer and Dianne Feinstein introduced the companion Senate bill later in the month.

Thanks to the leadership of these wilderness champions, the bill was advanced out of the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee in less than a month. Although there is no date set yet for a full Senate vote, this development positions the bill well for movement this year.

In early February, the legislation also picked up an important endorsement. Governor Schwarzenegger's office sent a letter to Chairman Richard Pombo (R-CA) of the House Resources Committee announcing his unequivocal support for the bill. The governor urged Representative Pombo's committee to act on the legislation as soon as possible.

The support of Governor Schwarzenegger raises the profile of this important conservation measure and demonstrates to the rest of the country the premium Californians place on preserving our natural heritage. Chairman Pombo has not yet given a date for a hearing, but promised the bill would indeed receive one soon.

CWC Sponsors Off-Road Vehicle Conference

Activists, private landowners, and concerned residents convened in Joshua Tree in February to examine the growing problem of illegal and destructive off-road vehicle use on private and public lands in the desert. Thanks to a massive volunteer effort led by Morongo Basin Conservation Association, California Wilderness Coalition, and Community ORV Watch "Desert Communities Under Siege: Strategies for Protecting our Public and Private Lands from Off-Road Vehicle Abuse" was a huge success. The Alliance for Responsible Recreation, a coalition of conservation organizations, community groups, and private landowners planned and sponsored the conference.

More than 150 participants shared experiences, learned about relevant laws and regulations, questioned public officials, and developed strategies for moving forward. BLM Desert District Manager Linda Hansen joined representatives from county supervisor's offices, planning departments, and sheriff's offices on a panel discussion focusing on the off-road vehicle crisis in the desert. Officials on the panel heard residents' concerns about illegal off-road vehicle use in the desert, and endorsed many of Alliance's proposals for addressing off-road vehicle abuse. Since the conference, the Alliance has held follow up meetings in Yucca Mesa, Red Mountain, Temecula, and Joshua Tree.



Bureau of Land Management Plans for the Future

The Bureau of Land Management (BLM) is in the process of preparing management plans for most of its northern and central California field offices. These plans will guide the agency's decisions regarding logging, mining, cattle grazing, off-road vehicle use and other activities for the next decade or more. The planning process offers conservationists an important opportunity to work with the agency to conserve vital natural areas.

Public involvement is an essential requirement in the BLM's planning process. CWC has been working hard to encourage local activists to attend the agency's planning workshops. In addition, we have been providing our own extensive recommendations that a large number of areas in the six affected BLM field offices be protected in a natural state.

Park Service Mulls New Protections for San Gabriel

As a result of Representative Hilda Solis's (D-El Monte) San Gabriel River Watersheds Study Act of 2003, the National Park Service has begun studying "ways to improve historical, open and green space for families" in the San Gabriel watershed.

The study could eventually call for the establishment of a national park or for improved coordination among the current patchwork of federal, state and locally managed public lands.

As described in the legislation, the study area covers more than 1,000 square miles, or 700,000 acres. Most of the study area is located in Los Angeles County, with small portions in Orange and San Bernardino counties.

The Park Service study should complement other conservation efforts in the region. Representative Solis and Senator Barbara Boxer have introduced the Southern California Wild Heritage Act, which seeks to protect many wild areas in the watershed as wilderness. The Pleasant View, Cucamonga Additions, Sheep Mountain Additions, Silver Mountain and West Fork proposed wilderness areas are all included in both the wilderness legislation and the Park Service study.
